2023 has been an incredible year of opportunity after launching the notfor-profit months before the Covid-19 pandemic. BWS Family Life Center did not waiver from providing food to community. the Our robust team of volunteers, along with high school students,

fraternal organizations, and individuals as far as northern Chicago continued their commitment to providing food to more than 10,000 individuals. We are indebted to grow our relationship with the Greater Chicago Food Depository as we continue to create tables of welcome to those we serve.

Our focus on science, technology, engineering, arts, and math (STEAM) became a reality with the introduction of our first summer camp. The Youth Enrichment Scholar (Y.E.S.) Program was born with a grant made possible by the Chicago Department of Public Health (CCDPH). Students promoted



into grades 3 through 8 participated in a summer program with a focus on STEAM. From a reptile rendezvous at Sandridge Nature Center to adopting a pig at Fair Oaks Farm in Indiana, student lives were enriched and reading, math, and science skills were reinforced. We also honored our commitment to advocating for those impacted by the carceral system. On August 12, 2023, Second Chance redoubled its commitment to assist individuals by providing resources for expunging or sealing their criminal records.



The Expungement Information Summit facilitated connections between the community and various stakeholders, including judges, the Criminal Bureau of the Cook County Clerk of the Circuit Court, attorneys, legal clinics, law enforcement, and other mutual aid organizations. Notably, the summit marked a milestone with a record of seeing nearly 65 individuals seeking to have their records reviewed.

These achievements are possible because of the hands of those who have a heart for the neighbors in our communities. I am grateful to our Board of Directors who have entrusted me with the mission of the BWS Family Life Center. Together we are seeing dynamic change.

I am reminded of the African proverb that says, "If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together." While there is still much work to do, as a team we can achieve our long-term goals.
